

AS I SEE IT: I'm having a birthday Wednesday, April 3rd. The congregation sang "Happy Birthday" to me last Sunday morning, March 31st. It's a wonderful thing to celebrate one's birthday. Birthdays are a joyful celebration of the day you entered this world. Birthdays mark the anniversary of your birth. It's a time to reflect on the journey you've taken. The lessons you've learned. And the memories you have created. Birthdays bring people together. Friends, family, and loved ones gather to honor you, share laughter, and create new memories. It's a chance to strengthen bonds, express love, and show appreciation for one another. Birthday wishes are whispered, or written on birthday cards which carry hope, dreams, and blessings for you for the year ahead. DID YOU KNOW EASTER DOESN'T END AFTER EASTER?

Easter is even more significant than Christmas which celebrates Christ's birth, because Easter celebrates Christ's Resurrection! The Easter season stretches from Easter Sunday, which was the last Sunday in March this year, to Pentecost Sunday May 19th. Every day is now in the season of Easter and is so important it's treated as a continuation of Easter Sunday itself. During these seven full weeks, you should focus fully on the new life brought by Christ's resurrection. But how many days are between Easter and Pentecost? If Pentecost Sunday is the seventh Sunday after Easter Sunday, shouldn't that mean that the Easter season is only 49 days long. 7 X 7. But you must count both Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday in the 50 days of the Easter season. So, even after Easter Sunday has passed, you're to keep on celebrating and wishing your friends a "Happy Easter." Christ has destroyed death. So, what reminds you of Easter in our Sanctuary, our safe place? The empty cross over the altar! But we also have the tall white Paschal Candle to remind you of Easter. The word Paschal refers to anything associated with the Christian holiday of Easter. In another sense, Paschal is connected to the Jewish holiday of Passover and can describe everything related to the Passover celebration. So, "Paschal" encompasses both the celebration of Easter in Christianity and the historical significance of Passover in Judaism. And white is the color of the Easter Season. So, when you see white paraments on the Altar, Pulpit, and Lectern during Easter, remember the purity, resurrection, and the promise of everlasting life. Have a Happy Easter!

WHAT IS AN AED

An AED, or automated external defibrillator, is a sophisticated yet easy-to-use medical device designed to assist individuals experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. We have signs showing the way to ours in Fellowship Hall.

HEALTH AND SAFETY COMMITTEE

Mission Statement: To advance healthier lives and a safe environment. Education is the key.

<u>Committee Members</u>: G.B. Barnard, retired pediatrician; Kathy Barnard, retired RN with multiple areas of practice; Sherry Geiger, Chairperson, Nurse Practitioner, especially anesthesia.

Focus: [1] Monthly check and documentation for AED (Automated External Defibrillator), fire extinguishers, and First Aid cabinet; [2] Annual check in October by Collier Medical services for AED; [3] Annual check in October by ABC Fire Extinguisher; [4] First Aid Cabinet: documented list of all items available in folder, plus what questions that need to be asked prior to dispensing those items: example, "Are you allergic to anything?"; [5] Potential Training for: a) CPR and AED, b) How to operate the fire extinguisher, c) Potential safety issues inside of church/home, d) Educate about items in first aid cabinet and how to use them. e) Administration of nasal Narcan spray – how to assess the response at a victim. f) Crime prevention. g) Crowd control. h) *Lifevac* demonstration. Collier County has many active organizations that will provide educational information: example, Greater Naples Fire Department, Step Smart Collier, and Collier County Sheriff. We are now investigating two others adds to the First Aid cabinet: 1) Fire blanket. 2) New updated tourniquet. Any suggestions. Please let us know. Potential to include the entire community, not just members of ECC.
